Mineral summary

What we delivered in FY25/26

- 30 licence applications granted (21 Exploration, 2 Retention and 7 Prospecting)
- 162 licence variations approved – including 42 licence condition changes, 25 partial cancellations and 17 transfers
- 96.8% of work plan decisions (30 out of 31) made within statutory timeframe
- A revised Competing Exploration Licence Applications Policy, endorsed by the Resources Victoria CEO on 21 November 2025 and commenced operation on 1 December 2025.
- Licence application and licence variation compliance declaration:
 - Licence applications take up at 74% (70 out of 95)
 - 11 of the applications with a declaration were granted with a median end to end timeframe of 182 days.
 - 6 for the applications without declaration were granted with a median end to end timeframe of 720 days.
 - Licence variations (Renewals and Transfer) take up at 60% (73 out of 121)
 - The inclusion of declaration in licence variations is associated with faster processing times, resulting in shorter departmental and end-to-end completion timeframes

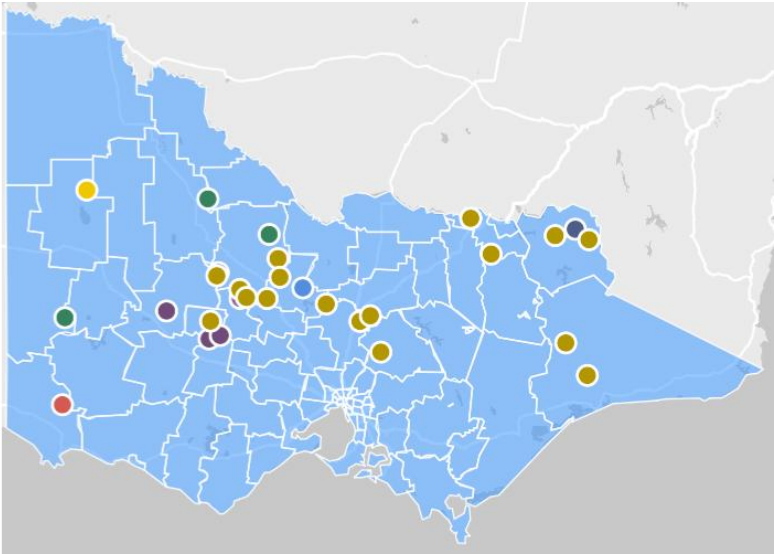

Mineral summary – rehabilitation liabilities

What we delivered in FY25/26

- Assessed \$6.5M from 102 bonds.
 - 14 bond increase (\$5.4M)
 - 30 initial bonds (\$306K)
 - 51 bonds released as rehabilitation commitments were met (\$467K)
- Implementation of the Financial Hardship Policy to provide temporary assistance to eligible operators while ensuring rehabilitation obligations continue to be met. Options may include staged bond payments and agreed actions to reduce rehabilitation liabilities over time, with regular progress monitoring.
- Progressive rehabilitation and more frequent self-assessment can reduce bond held to accurately reflect current rehabilitation liability (for more information see resources.vic.gov.au/community-and-land-use/rehabilitation)

Minerals summary – compliance

What we delivered in FY25/26

- 216 audits, inspections, rapid inspections and meetings were conducted in FY25/26.
- 98 compliance actions were recorded, with 38 relating to failure to submit annual returns.
- 99 incidents reported, relating to fire and smouldering, 72 incidents were from the declared mines.
- 37 community complaints were received across 13 sites, with blasting related noise and vibration and extraction outside the boundaries were the main concerns.
- 32 community reference group meetings were attended.

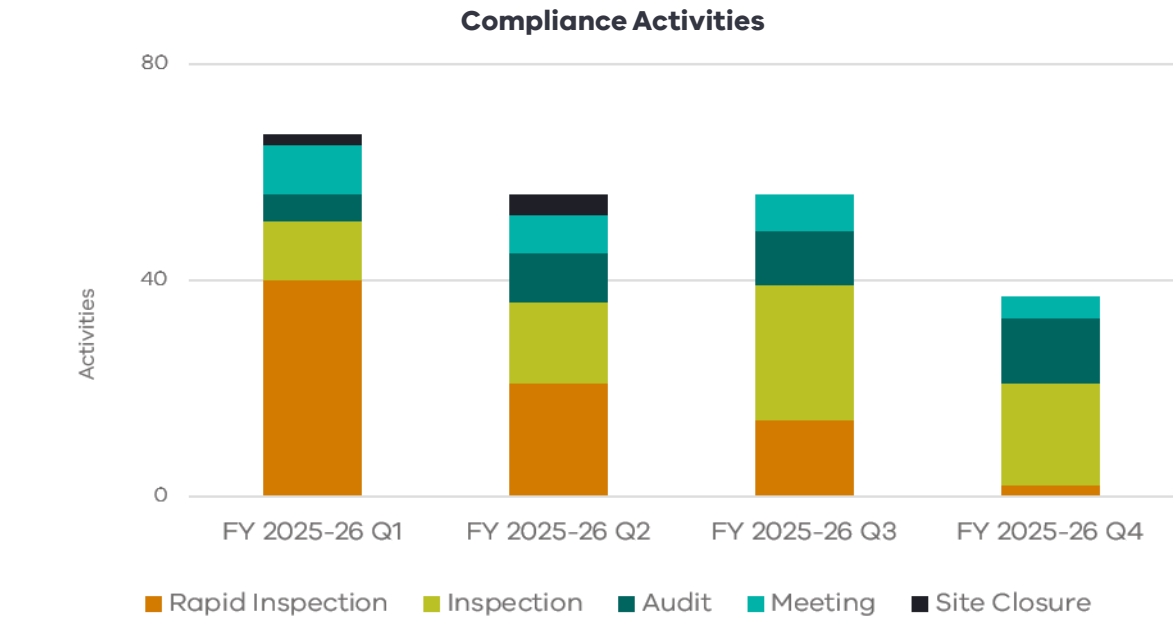

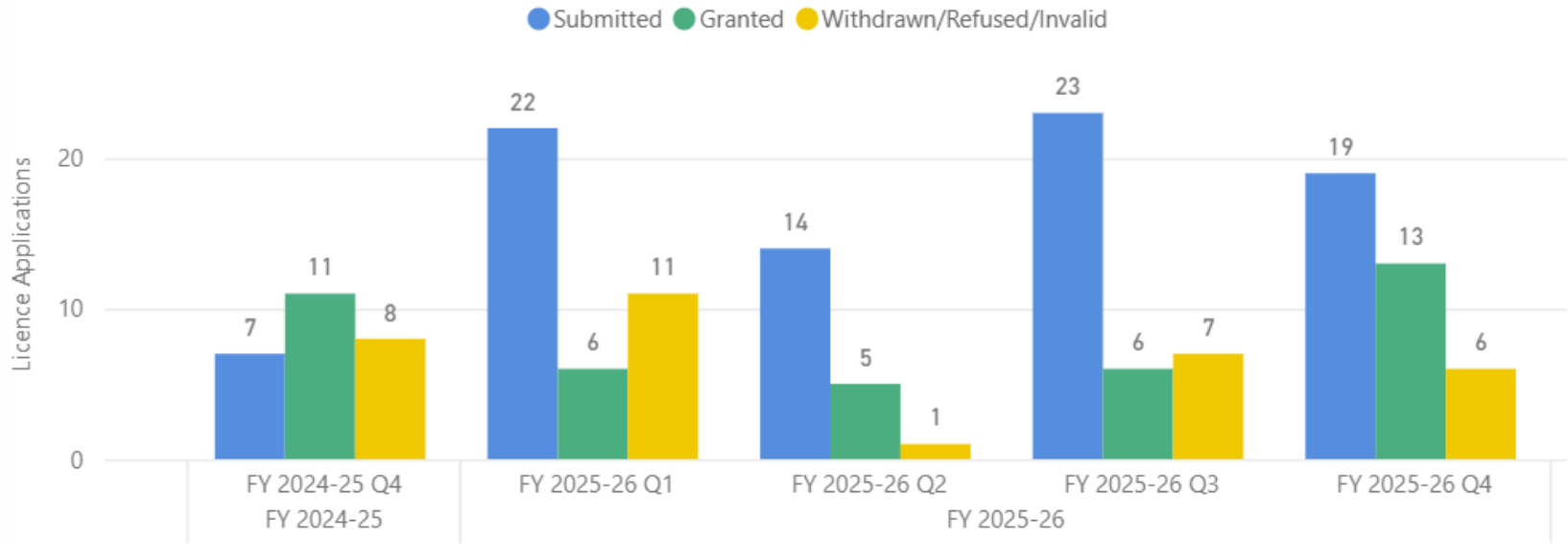
Key points to note

- In 25/26 inspectors attended 77 mineral sites on the rapid inspection program.
- During the first half of FY25/26, the Compliance team prioritised rapid inspections, focusing on swift and targeted compliance checks. The second half has shifted emphasis towards audits & inspections
- Compliance activities have and will continue to focus on maintenance and monitoring of tailings dams, removing derelict and redundant plant, rehabilitation and non-compliance with licence conditions aligned to our 5 priority areas.
- Where significant non-compliance or uncontrolled risks have been identified, the prompt issuing of remedial notices has and will continue to occur.

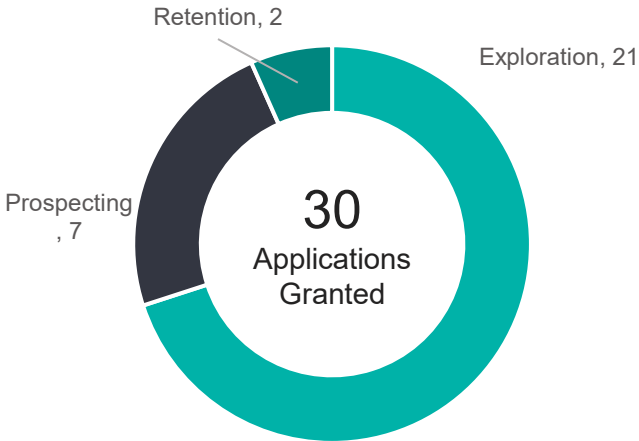


Mineral Licences Summary

FY2025-26 Application Granted by Licence Types



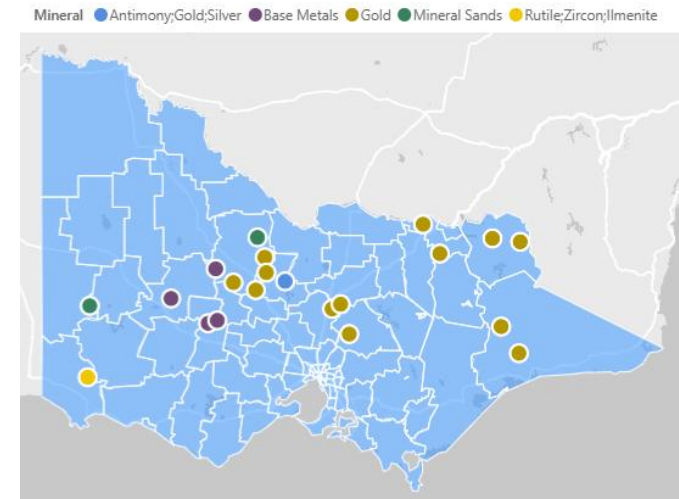
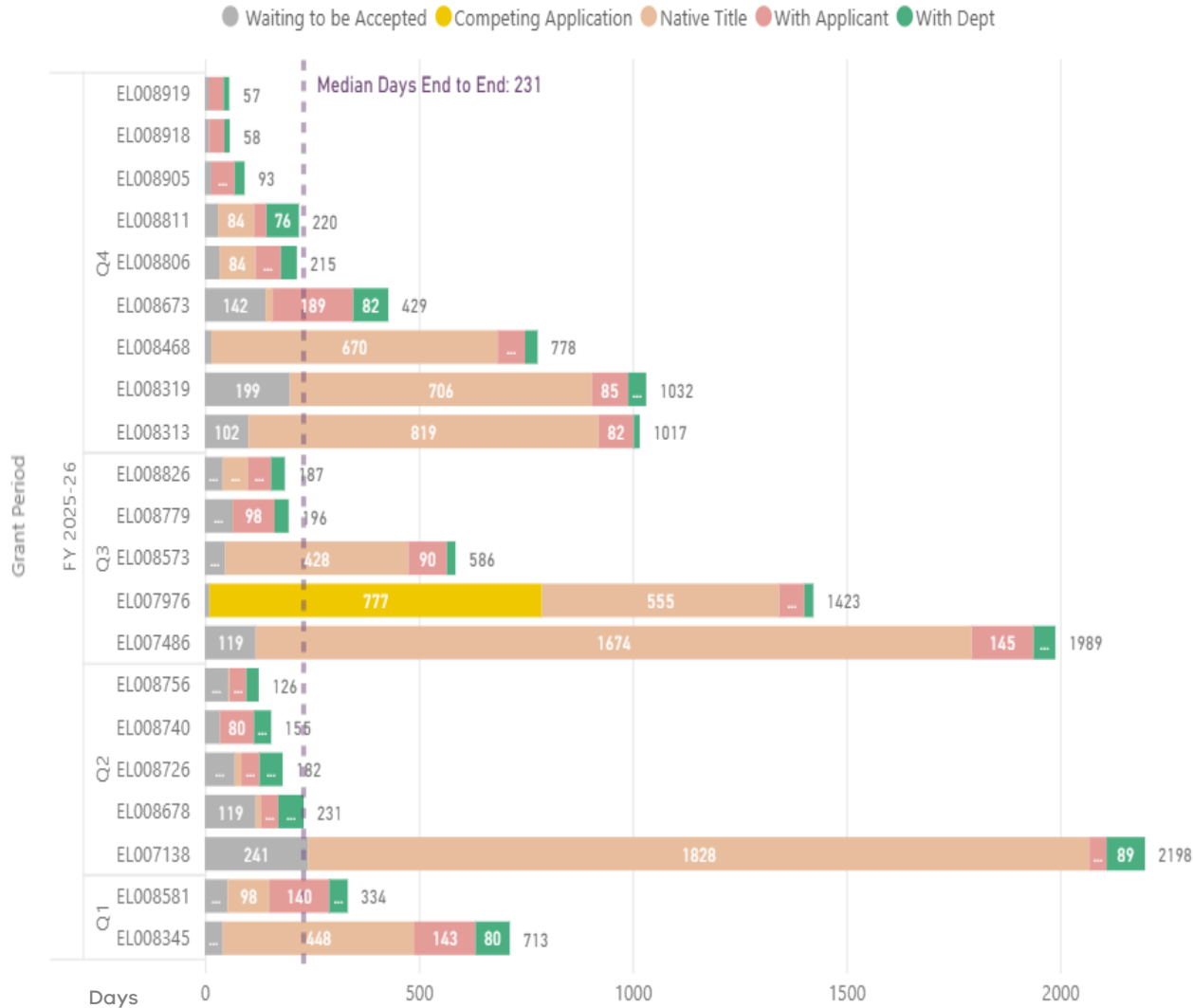

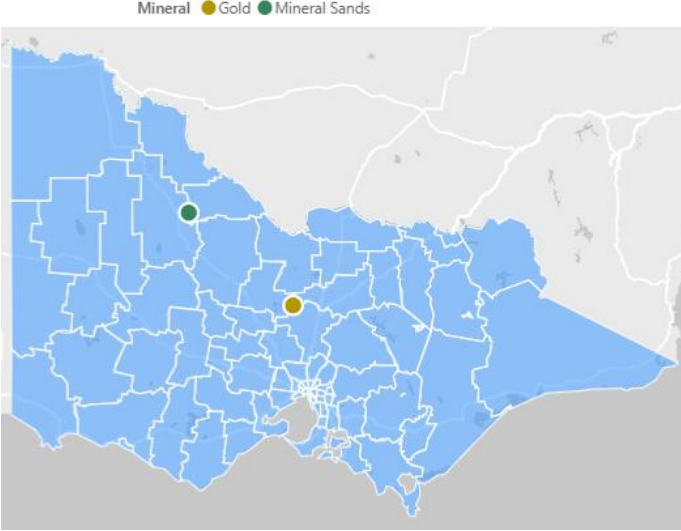

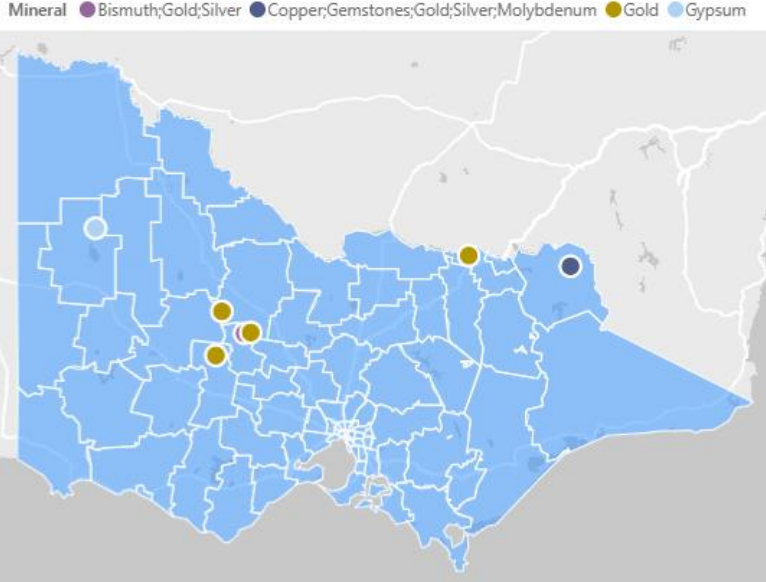

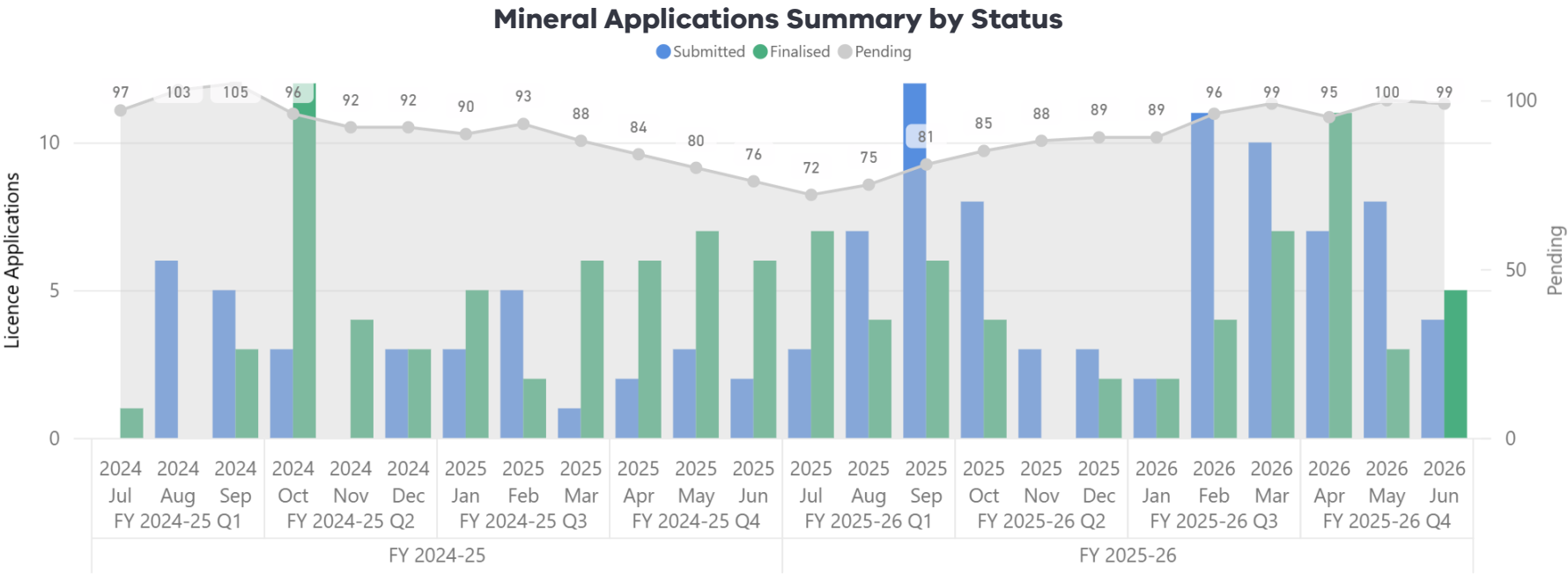
Prospecting Licence Granted FY 2025-26 (1 July 2025 to 30June 2026)



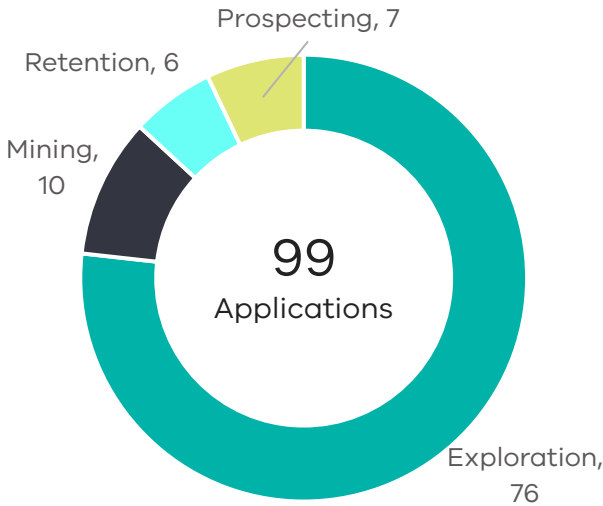

Mineral Licence Applications in the Pipeline (30 June 2026)



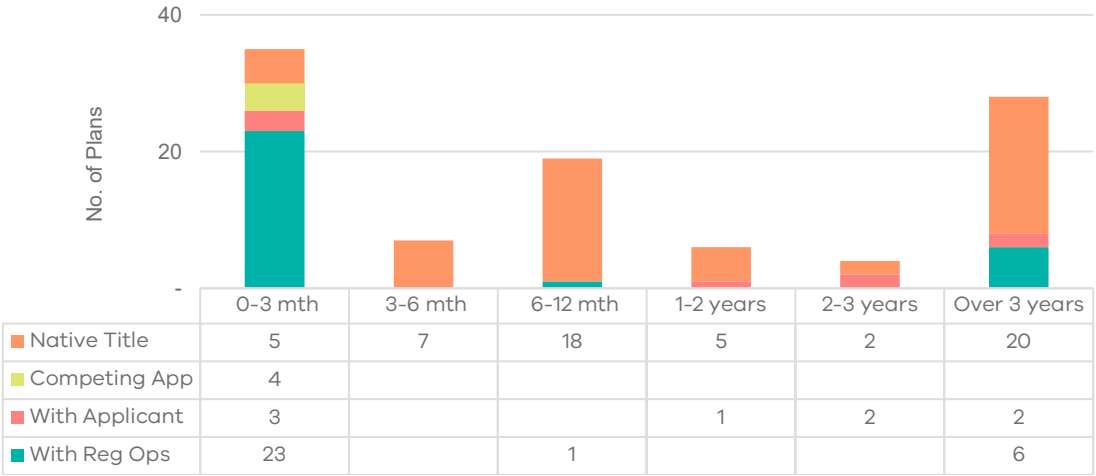
Pending Application Licence Types

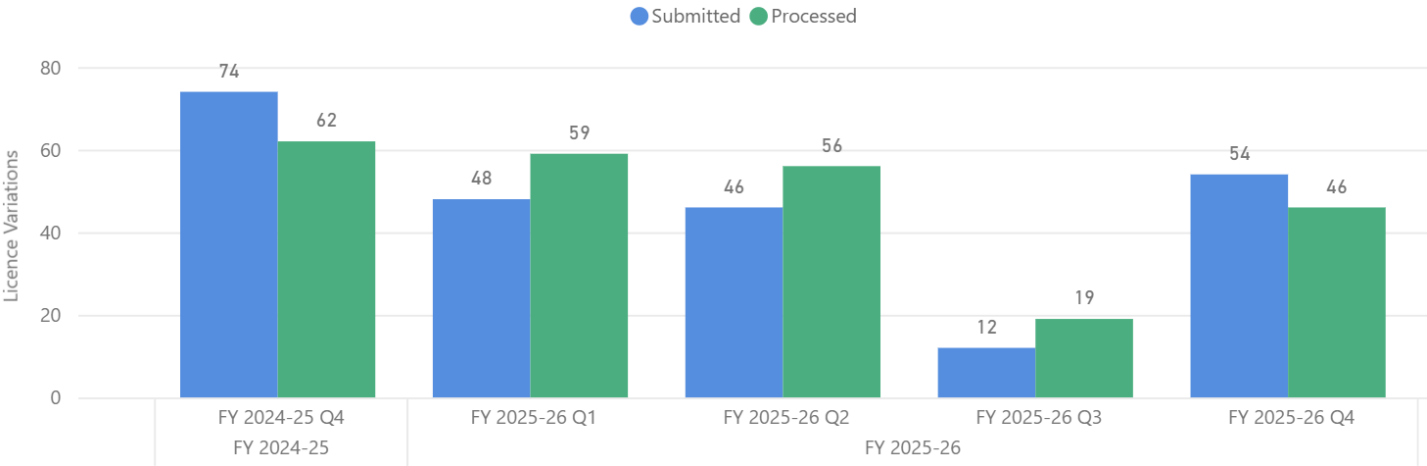
Stage Duration of pending licence applications

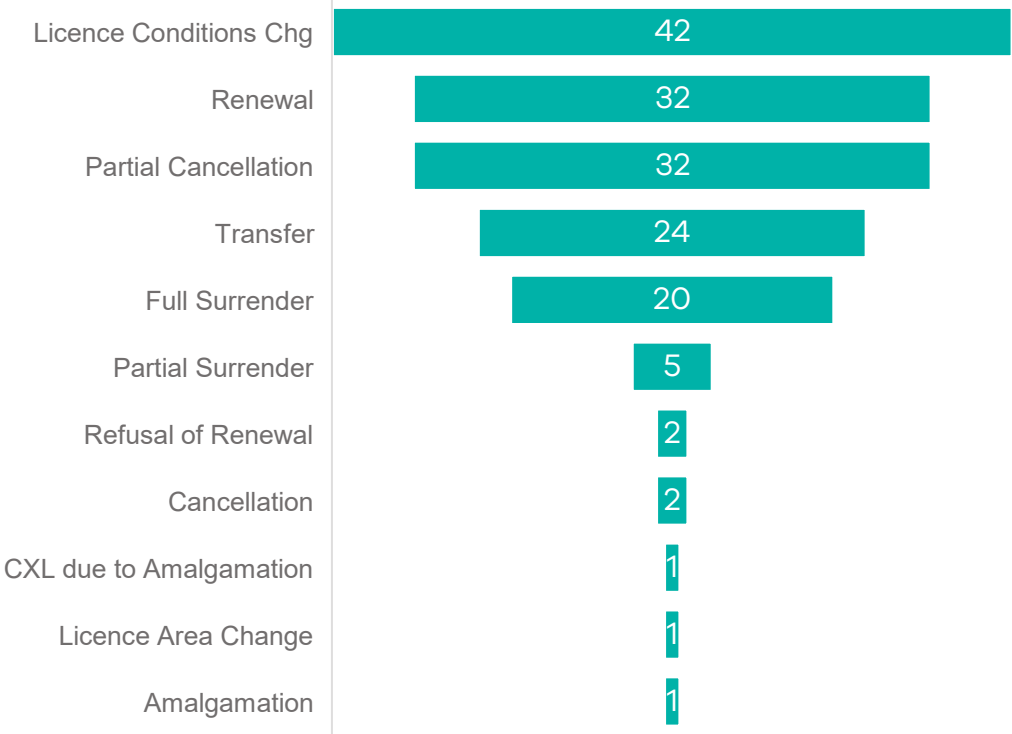

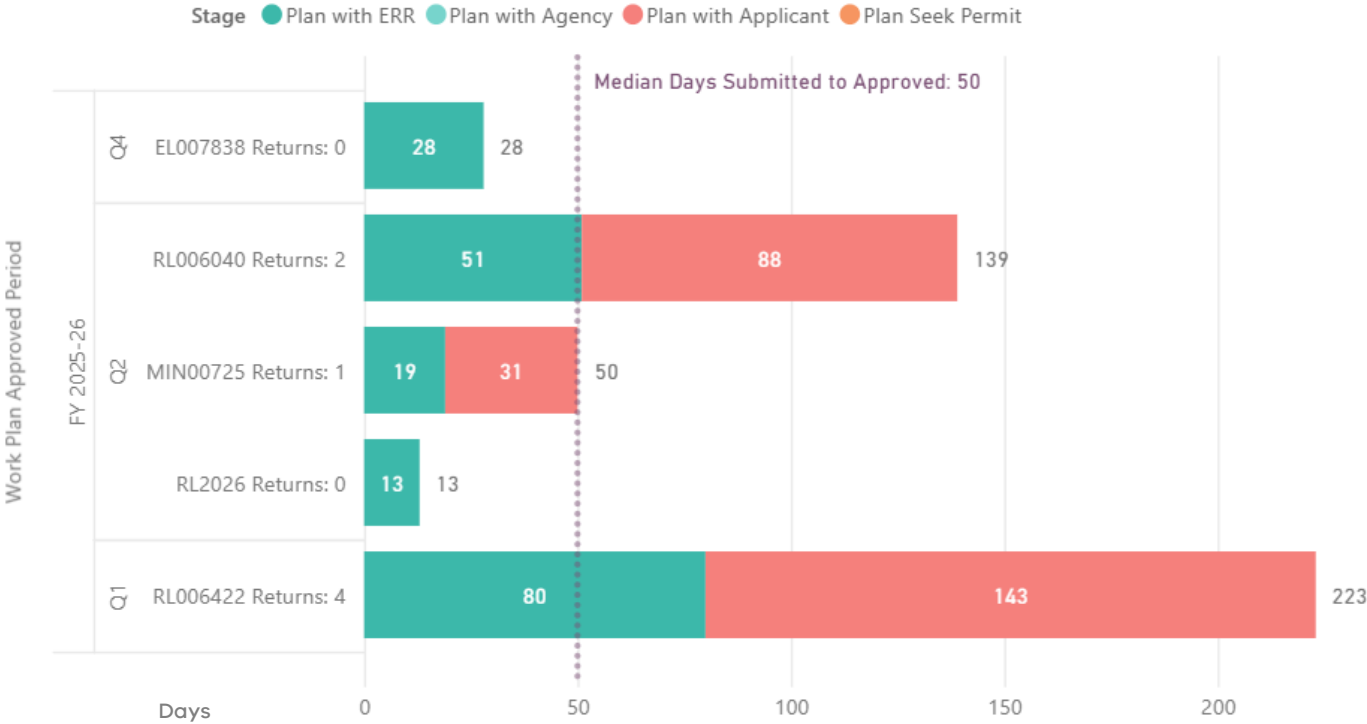
Variation Approved FY2025-26

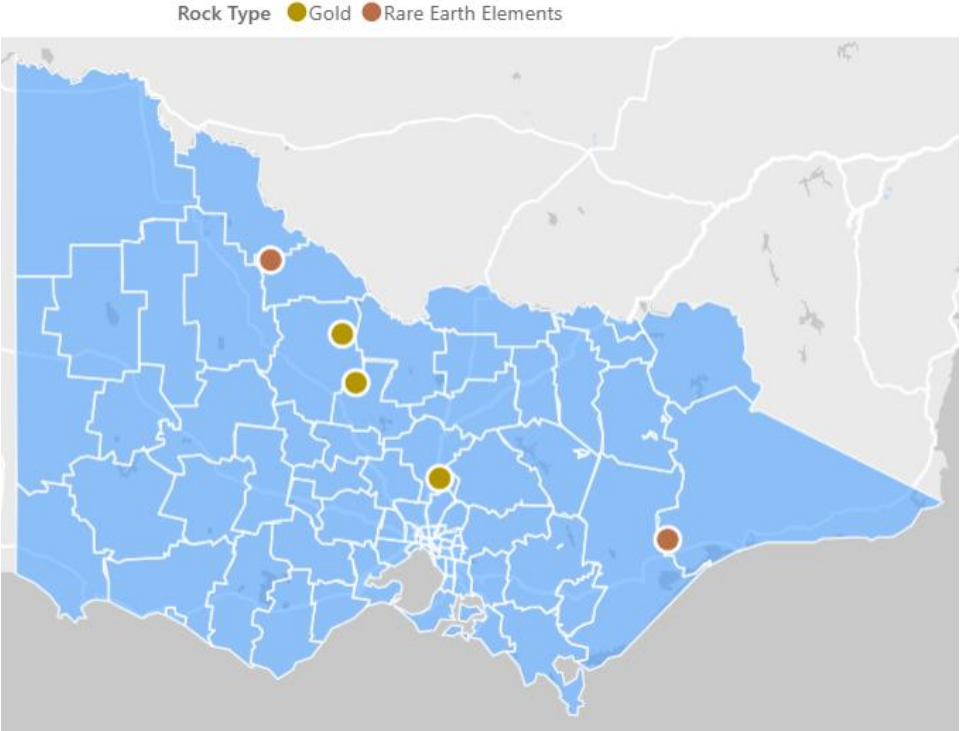
Initial Mineral Work Plan Approved FY 2025-26 (1 July 2025 to 30 June 2026)

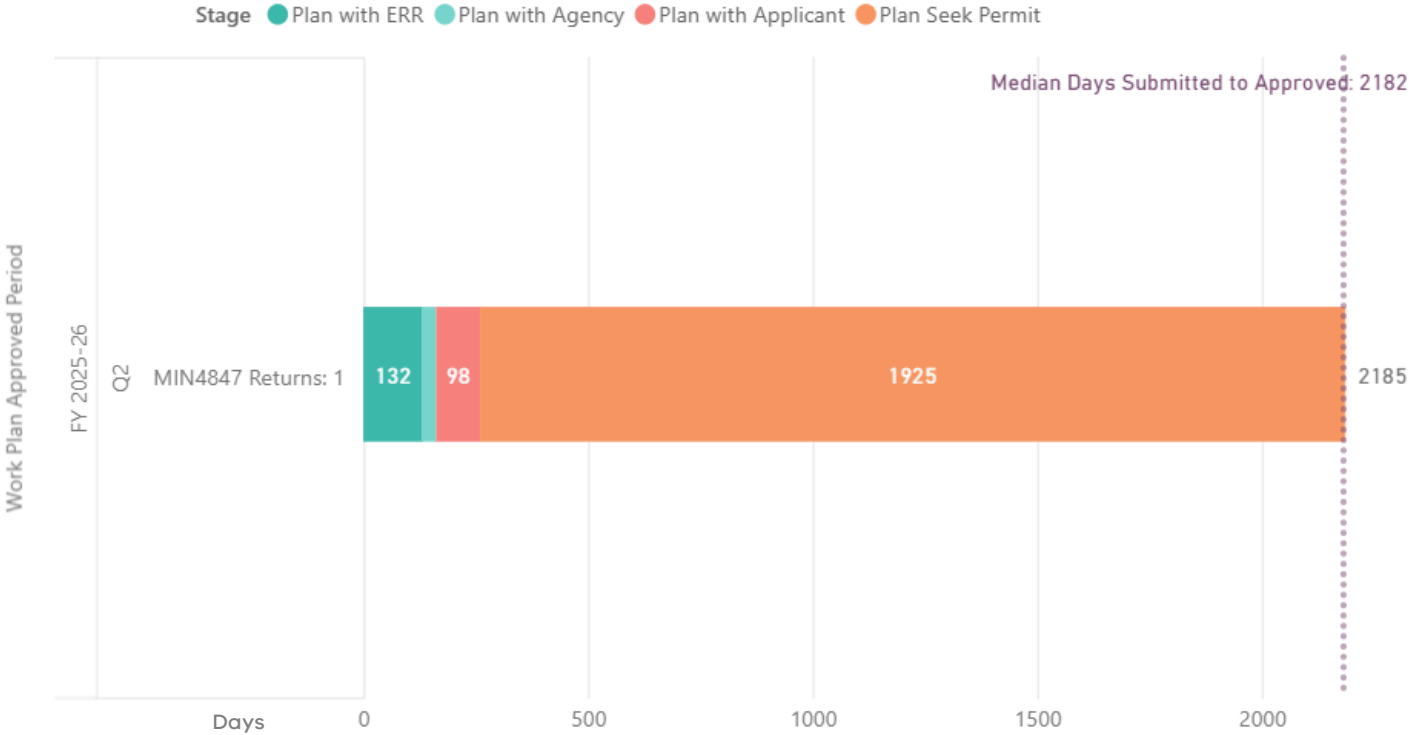

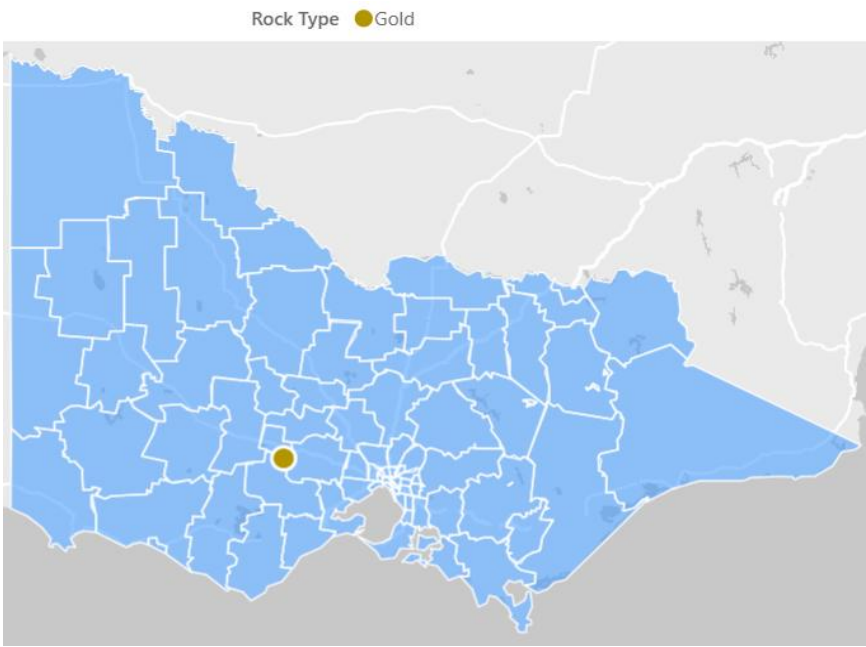
Mineral Work Plan Variation Approved FY 2025-26 (1 July 2025 to 30 June 2026)

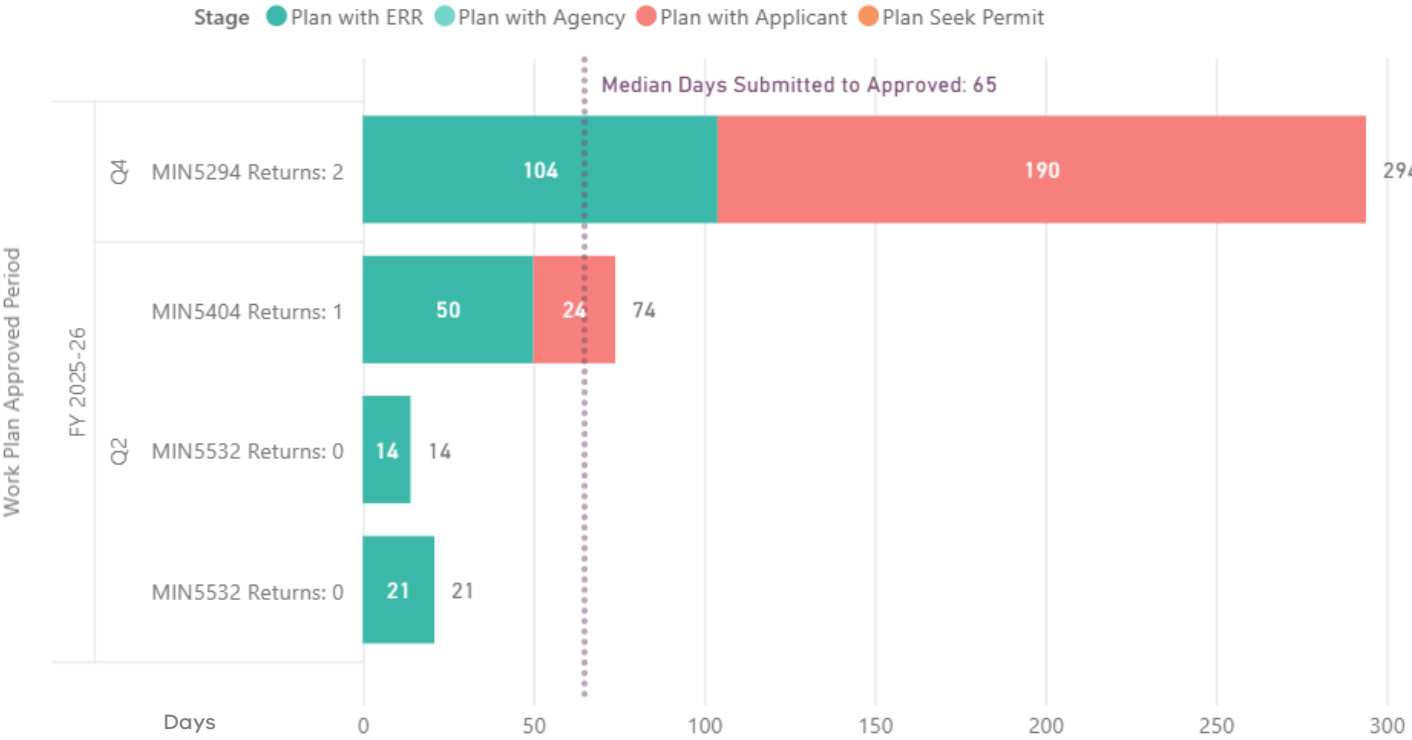

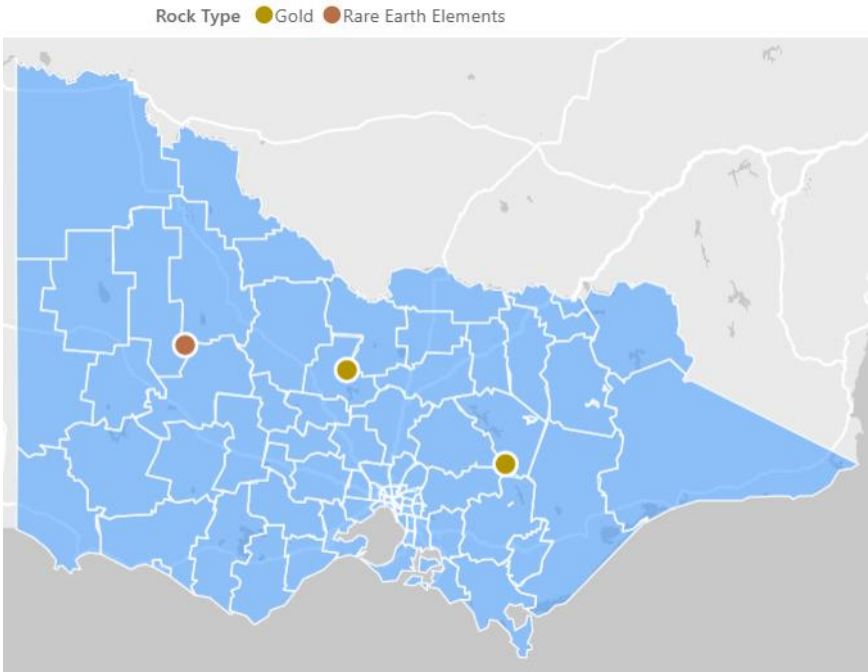
Mineral Work Plan Variation Approved FY 2025-26 (1 July 2025 to 30 June 2026)

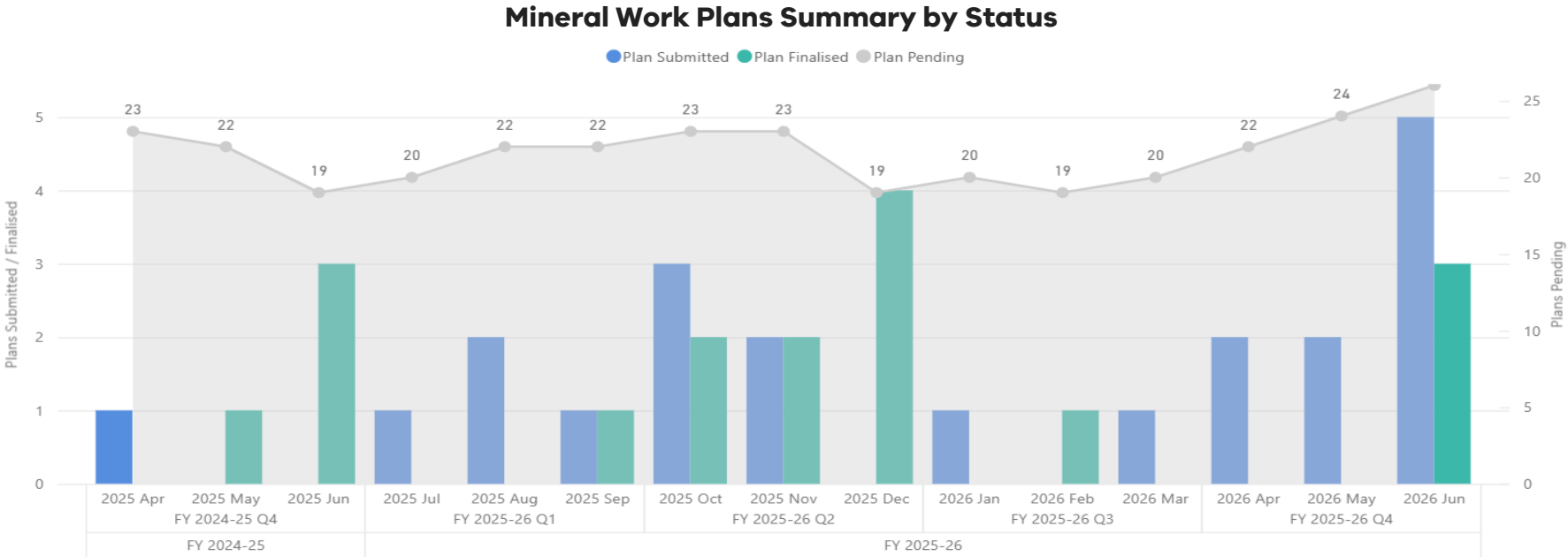

Mineral Work Plan Applications In the Pipeline (30 June 2026)

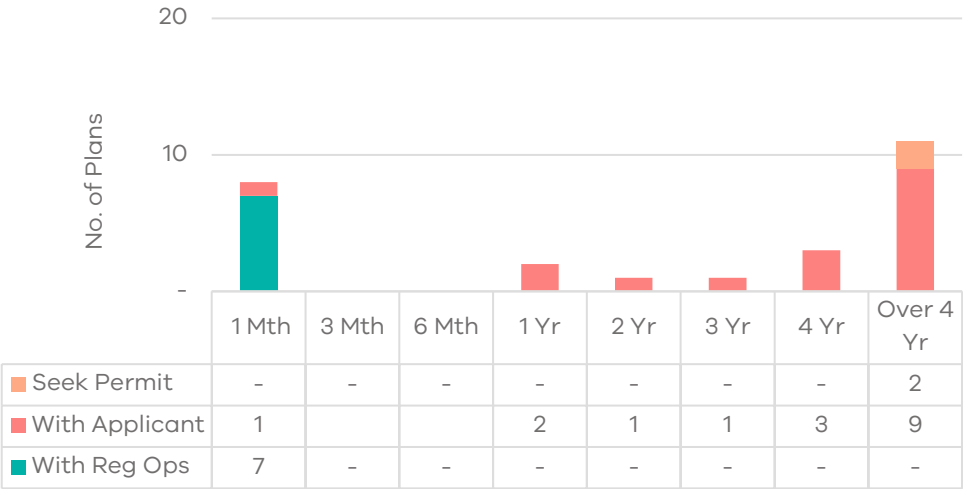

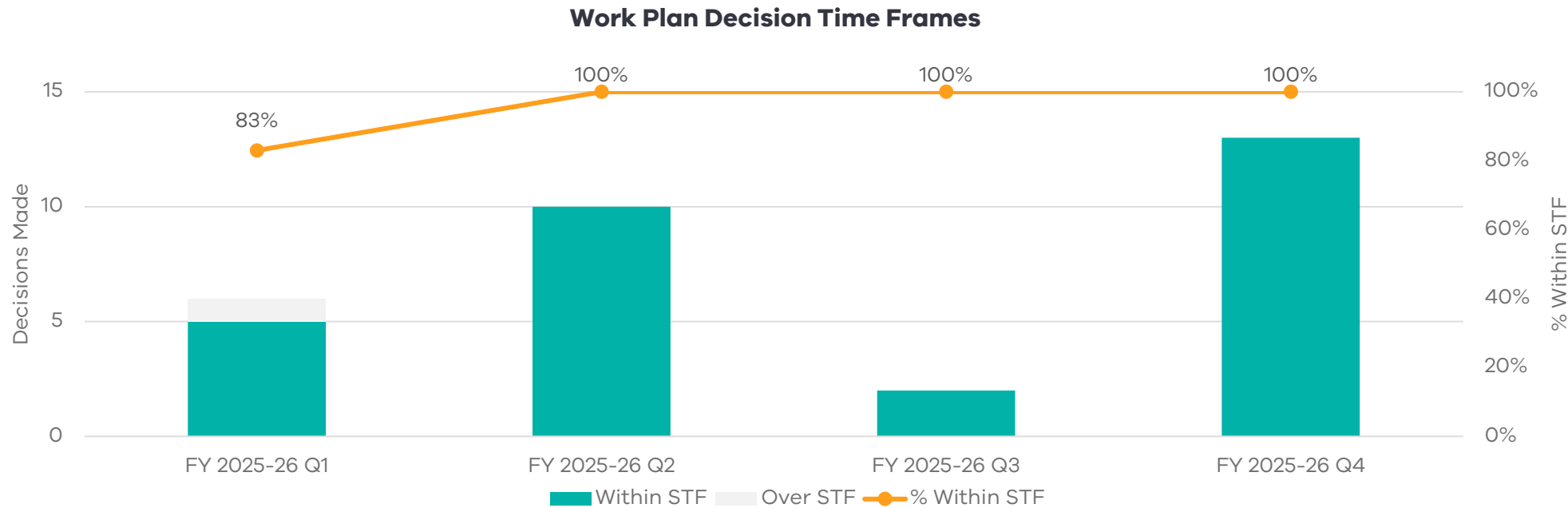

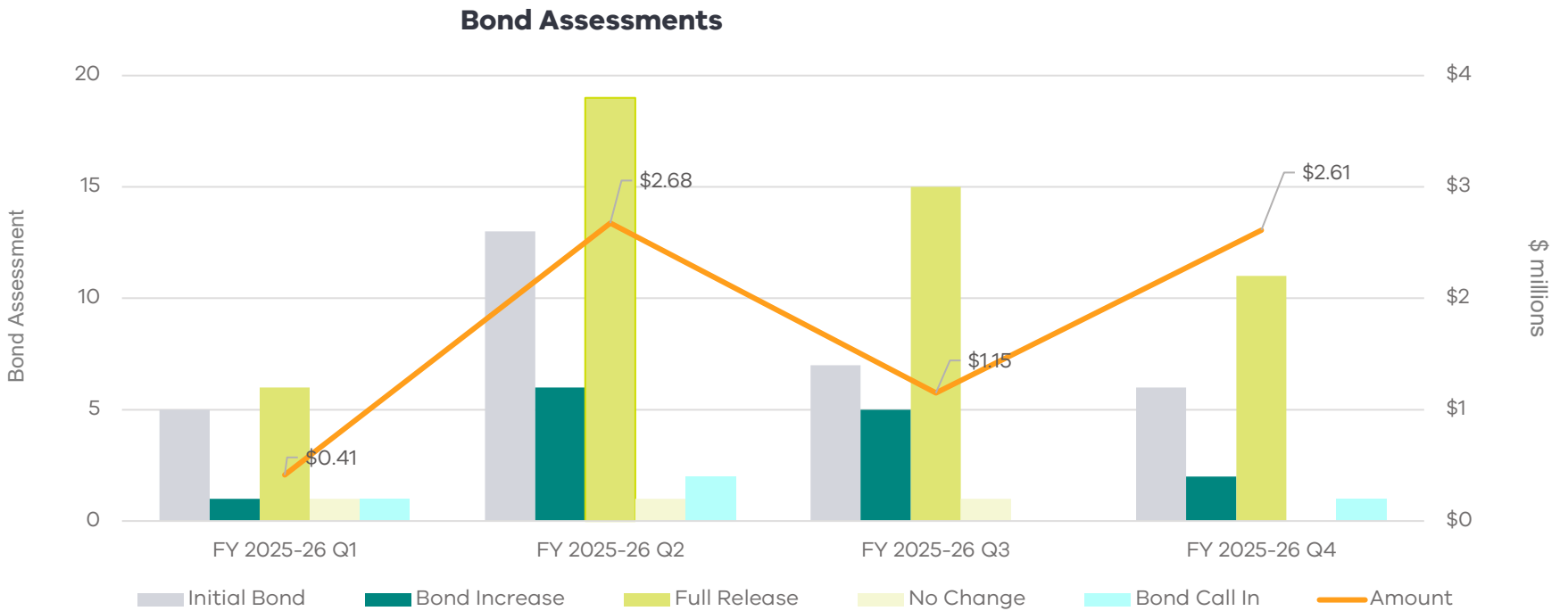

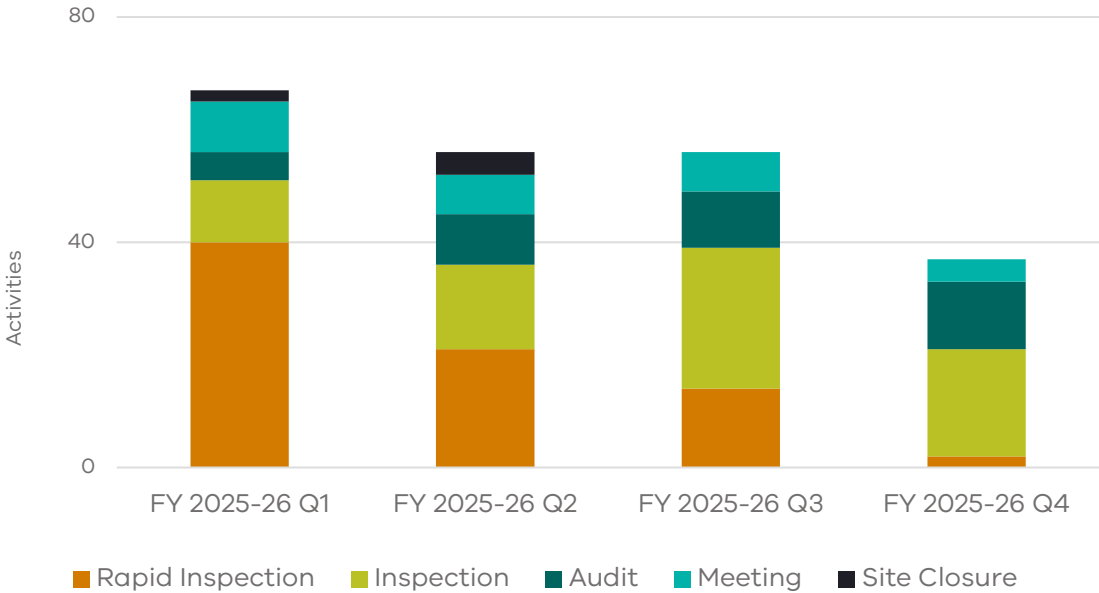

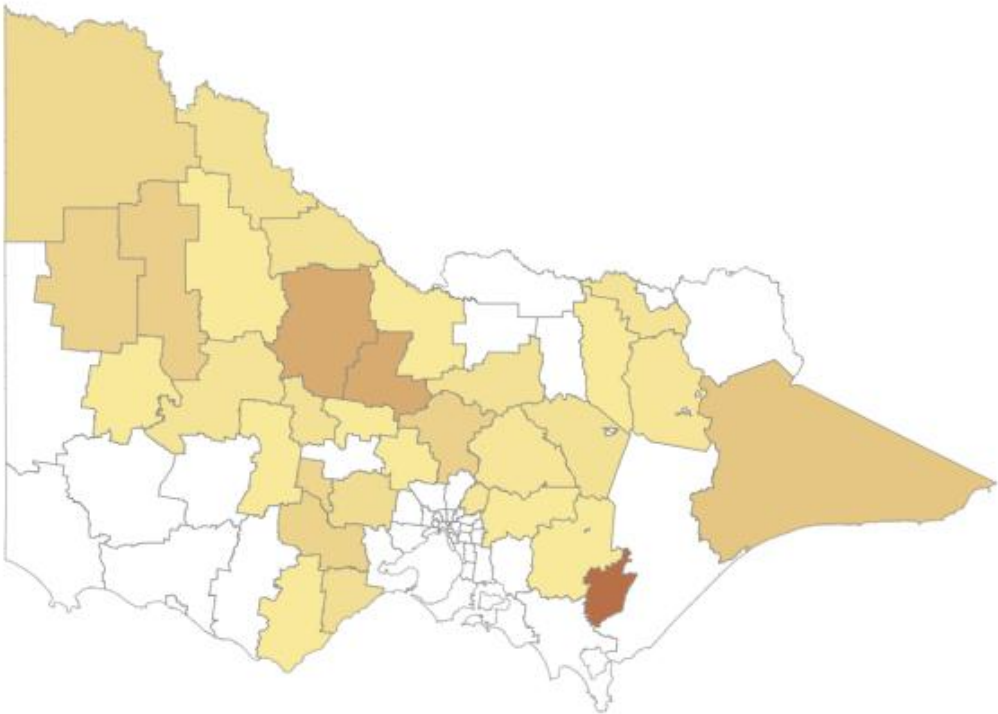

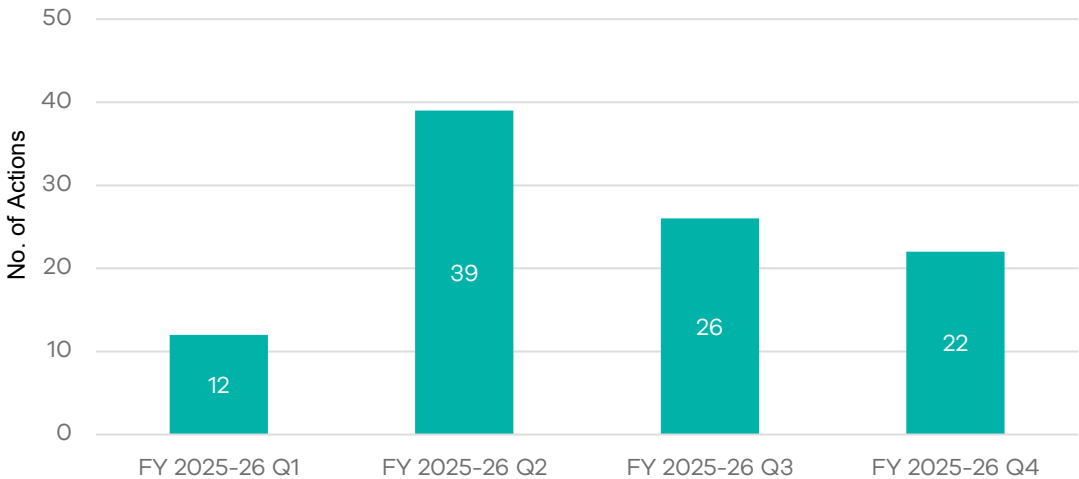

In FY25/26 , a total of 99 incidents were reported. The key themes identified were:

- **Fire & Smouldering:** The majority of incidents involved small, localised fires and smoulders, primarily associated with conveyors, mobile plant, stockpiles and electrical equipment.
- **Equipment Reliability & Maintenance:** Recurrent failures involving idlers, bearings, conveyors, brakes, hydraulics and electrical systems were common contributing factors.
- **Environmental & Geotechnical Impacts:** Rainfall, water ingress and weather conditions contributed to slope stability issues, spontaneous combustion events, dust exceedances and water quality impacts.
- **Emergency Response & Incident Management:** Early detection systems and effective emergency response ensured most incidents were quickly controlled, limiting consequences.
- **People, Safety & Compliance:** Most incidents resulted in no injuries; however, isolated worker safety events, environmental compliance issues and one underground fatality were reported.

In FY25/26 , a total of 50 complains were reported. The key themes identified were:

- **Noise, Vibration & Amenity Impacts:** The majority of complaints related to noise from mining operations and blasting-related ground vibrations impacting nearby residents and communities.
- **Water Quality & Environmental Concerns:** Complaints included alleged heavy metal contamination, groundwater impacts, tailings dam leakage, sediment discharges, turbid water entering waterways and other pollution concerns.
- **Operational & Compliance Issues:** Community concerns were raised regarding licence compliance, extracting outside approved areas, vegetation removal, waste dumping and multiple alleged non-compliances.
- **Exploration Activities & Land Access:** Several complaints involved exploration activities, including alleged unauthorised entry, trespass, soil sampling, roadside drilling and landholder access concerns.
- **Community & Stakeholder Engagement:** A number of matters were general enquiries, neighbour concerns and requests for information regarding mining and exploration activities near residential areas.
